Walk-In Ministry OPRF Nonprofit Seeks Clergy Input On Homelessness

Rev. Harriet Cross remembers her days of being homeless. The Northwestern University journalism major had one quarter left before graduating, but a series of personal and financial struggles weighed in, forcing her to move into a shelter in Evanston.

After staying the maximum of three months at Hilda's Place, Cross, now pastor of Cornerstone United Methodist Church, 171 N. Cuyler Ave., moved into a transitional apartment with a woman whom she could best describe as frightening. Cross said she regularly pushed furniture in front of her bedroom door at night for fear her roommate might kill or injure her. The woman had threatened her repeatedly.

That was 19 years ago, Cross told a group of clergy and faith-community members Tuesday at a clergy breakfast at First United Church, 848 Lake St. The event, sponsored by the Oak Park/River Forest Walk-In Ministry (WIM) and Community of Congregations, sought to help faith leaders uncover different approaches to tackling the increasing problems of homelessness and poverty in the area.

Cross, who also is president of the Community of Congregations, shared her story in hopes that it would shed light on the emotional and psychological components of homelessness and help attendees develop strategies for assisting those who are vulnerable and lacking basic resources.

"People who go to homeless shelters are on a journey," Cross said. "There were lots of stories of relationships that fell apart -- of alienation. We all were looking for someone who cared enough to share with us ... to treat us as human beings."

That's where an agency such as WIM can make the biggest impact, said Cristy Harris, WIM executive director, after Cross' speech.

"We are a place where people can come to be treated with respect and kindness," Harris said. "We are seeking a better approach to poverty, to help people long term. We listen to them and try to help them with solutions that hopefully will prevent them from ever becoming homeless."

WIM was founded in 2005 in response to the homeless and at-risk people who came to the doors of churches/religious organizations in the Oak Park/River Forest area asking for assistance. The faith leaders found that they were running out of discretionary funds to help those in need and that there was no reliable way to track those who went from church to church asking for help, and who used the aid to buy drugs or alcohol. The faith leaders of several organizations decided to pool their discretionary funds to better serve those in need.

"We are sensitive to the plight of those we endeavor to help," said Rev. Renee Willet, director of faith partners at WIM and one of its founders. Willet also is pastor of Fellowship Christian Church, 1106 W. Madison St. "This event is a step in reclaiming the connectivity to the human spirit ... to bring humanity back to inhumane conditions."

Despite its name, WIM is a social-service agency, not a ministerial group. The agency helps clients, regardless of religious affiliation, with emergency assistance such as bus passes, funds to get state IDs, rental assistance, and referrals to agencies such as Public Action to Deliver Shelter, Inc. (PADS), which provides shelter and supportive services to the homeless and those at risk.

The Oak Park/River Forest Area Walk-In Ministry(WIM) is a 501(c)(3) nonprofit founded in November 2005 by local faith communities who wanted to provide assistance to the many people who sought emergency aid, but did not have the expertise or resources to do so. HOUSEHOLD BATTERIES: Don't throw your used household batteries into the trash; they are full of noxious ingredients that shouldn't go into landfills where they can leak out into the soil or water system. Instead, take them to a pickup center where they will be disposed of properly. In Oak Park, you can take them to Green Home Experts on Oak Park Avenue. All Walgreens locations in the City of Chicago will also take them, as well as branch locations of the Chicago Public Library.

GREEN TIP 2

This is the time of year when vegetable gardeners select and order seed for the upcoming growing season. Whether you are a gardener pondering your seed order or a food consumer without garden it is important to know where your food comes from. While you may be busy with many other activities know that our food is threatened by corporations that produce genetically-engineered seeds. Many seed companies have taken a pledge NOT to genetically engineer their seeds. As The Safe Seed Pledge states: "Agriculture and seeds provide the basis upon which our lives depend." So, get to know what you and your children are eating. Before ordering vegetable seeds take a look at the list of seed companies that have signed the Safe Seed Pledge. GREEN TIP: LIGHTEN UP

Most of us are concerned about energy consumption and doing the right thing for the environment. We have responded by purchasing compact fluorescent light (CFLs) bulbs. Now we ask how to recycle the CFLs. Here are a few helpful tips:

- Take time to read about CFLs by going to The Environmental Working Group website at http://www.ewg.org/home and reading: "Lighten Up in '09: Shopper's Guide to Compact Fluorescent Light Bulbs: Green Lighting Guide." This guide is full of great information, especially when it comes to safety concerns surrounding CFL's (where best to place them; breakage issues, etc.)
- 2. Where to recycle: Dressel's Hardware at 1137 Chicago Avenue in Oak Park, accepts CFL recycling. Please don't throw CFLs out in the trash or recycling bin as they contain mercury. For other recycling questions, go to http://Earth911.com.
